During the Can Serrat residency, Ching-In Chen finished *recombinant*, a hybrid book of poetry and prose inspired by the global history of Asian laborers within a speculative framework. *recombinant* examines the challenges of reconfiguring communal history and memory by juxtaposing voices from various diasporic and indigenous communities. In this way, Chen aims to create a transatlantic diasporic poetics that considers multiple modes and voices within the single location of a page. *recombinant*, published by Kelsey Street Press in 2017, won a Lambda Literary Award for Transgender Poetry in 2018.
